Notes:	<ol> <li>The Water Quality Monitoring Council met on February 23<sup>rd</sup>. The Council was updated on discussions with EPA Secretary Matt Rodriquez and Under Secretary Gordon Burns regarding the outcome of the Triennial Audit. Recommendations were made to tie workgroup efforts to existing administrative initiatives, such as the CA Water Action Plan. The council also had an update on the Delta Science Program's Data Summit Vision Document, comments will be submitted by March 18<sup>th</sup>. Cristina Grosso (SFEI), presented updates on EcoAtlas, which has incorporated new data from DWR's Vegetation Classification and Mapping Program (VegCAMP). Hildie Spautz (DFW) provided an update on indicator development for the State of the Estuary Report, the presentation can be found on ASANA. The next meeting will be on May 29<sup>th</sup> in Costa Masa.</li> <li>The Wetlands Monitoring group met on February 3<sup>rd</sup> and continue their strategic planning and budgeting efforts.</li> <li>The Healthy Stream Partnership met on February 20<sup>th</sup>. The group has decided to take a broader watershed approach, and thus will develop a rebranding effort. With the broader scope, it will be important to coordinate the overlap between the Estuary Workgroup and the Healthy Stream Partnership.</li> <li>The Data Management workgroup met on February 4<sup>th</sup>. The group reviewed their draft data standards report. They continue to request input on their process. The group also discussed the Delta Science Program's Data Summit Vision Document. Recommendations from the report will be integrated into the Business Planning efforts the workgroup will be going through.</li> <li>The BOG met on February 4<sup>th</sup> to discuss an upcoming study on Bass Lake monitoring. The group will meet next on April 15<sup>th</sup>.</li> <li>Safe To Swim- No New Update</li> <li>The Ocean/ Rocky intertidal Workgroup has not met recently, but will be presenting at the next Water Quality Monitoring Council meeting on their next steps and key initiatives they wish to pursue.</li> </ol>

Notes:	The SotER Advisory group will be meeting by the end of March to discuss indicator updates and the Collaborative Science (peer review) process. All indicators are still in progress and review.
	Hildie Spautz provided an update on the Bird Indicator. She has completed two side bars on the CA Black Rail and Sandhill Crane and is working on a full data indicator for water fowl. The indicator will focus on Dabbling duck abundance in the Delta and Suisun Marsh. The data set goes back to 1992 and the benchmark will be based on the first 10 years of data. The current status will be evaluating using the abundance average from the most recent 5 years.
	Betsy Wells is continuing work on the benthic indicator and hopes to have it out for the Collaborative Science process shortly. The technical report is being developed.
	April Hennessy has received feedback on the Zooplankton indicator and has made some adjustments. She is finalizing the data graphs and writing up the technical report.

Title of Topic:	CEMW Business Review	
Background:	The recently released <u>Triennial Audit Report</u> calls on California government agencies and the legislature to provide dedicated funding and staff to sustain and grow the Monitoring Council's workgroup efforts in order to fully implement the <u>Comprehensive Monitoring Program Strategy for California</u> . The audit report commits the Monitoring Council and its workgroups to provide the legislature and agency secretaries with the details of what is needed, in the form of workgroup business plans, within one year. According to the Audit Report, these business plans will outline specific needs (staff positions, budgets, etc.) and will highlight existing departmental mandates that can be addressed more effectively through the Monitoring Council's collaborative workgroup processes, tools, and the My Water Quality web portals. The goal of these business plans it to get a precise handle on resource needs to meet current goals and to ensure sustainability into the future.	
	<ul> <li>Here are three examples of existing mandates that are being or are propo addressed by Monitoring Council workgroups, tools, and portals:</li> <li>In 1993, the Governor announced the California Wetlands Conservated establishing a framework and strategy to "ensure no overall net I long-term net gain in the quantity, quality, and permanence of wand values in California" But in 2010 when the Natural Resource</li> </ul>	rvation Policy, oss and achieve a etland acreage

	attempted to determine whether there was any net loss of wetlands, differences in wetland definition, mapping protocols, and assessment methods between agencies made it impossible to deliver an answer. The Wetland Monitoring Workgroup has developed standardized definitions, mapping methods, and assessment protocols (and a concerted outreach effort to gain broad use of these tools) and is launching a status and trends monitoring program that together will allow California government to answer this question.	
	State Water Board Water Rights Decision 1641 requires the Department of Water Resources to periodically report on the quality of water resources within the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta and Suisun and San Pablo Bays as a condition of diverting water. These reports have been static documents to date. As part of its California Estuaries Portal, the Estuary Monitoring Workgroup is developing an on-line Interactive Water Quality Conditions Report for the Delta that will allow agency staff to gain access to the same data in a much more useful manner.	
	As part of its responsibility to manage the State Water Project, that provides drinking water to approximately two-thirds of California's population, the Department of Water Resources and State Water Project Contractors Authority are required to periodically report to the state's drinking water program (now the Division of Drinking Water within the State Water Board). These Watershed Sanitary Surveys contain information on contaminant sources and water quality issues. Members of the Safe Drinking Water Workgroup have suggested that an interactive report through the soon-to-be-built Safe-to-Drink Portal would provide the same information in a much more usable format.

Notes:	Kris Jones gave an update on the current status of the Monitoring Council's Triennial Audit Report. The workgroups have been tasked with creating their own Business plans. The general purpose is to identify key initiatives and departmental mandates that the workgroups can help fulfill. By tying work to bigger initiatives, such as the California Water Action Plan, funding sources could be easier to tap into.
