Purpose:	 a) Broaden the October 13 discussion between Jonathan Bishop, Linda Sheehan, and Val Connor to the entire Monitoring Council. Discuss governance issues relating to how often the Council will meet and for how long into the future. Current budgetary constraints factor into this latter topic.

members would also be present **Desired Outcome:** a) Agreement on the connection and differences between the two strategies and which organization is responsible for producing each one b) Agreement on governance issues relating to how often the Council will meet and for how long into the future c) Approval to move June 9, 2010 Monitoring Council meeting to Sacramento to coincide with the SWAMP Roundtable meeting (June 8 & 9), to focus the meeting on the connections between SWAMP and the Monitoring Council, and development of a stream ecosystem health internet portal. a) At the February 2, 2009 meeting, the Monitoring Council decided that the Background: comprehensive monitoring program strategy required by Water Code Section 13181(e)(1) would be a Monitoring Council product, due to the broader focus of the Monitoring Council as compared with the State Water Board. Pursuant to Water Code Section 13181(e)(7), the Water Board, in coordination with the Monitoring Council, is tasked with updating the SWAMP Comprehensive Monitoring and Assessment Strategy (called "needs assessment" in the legislation) "in light of the benefits of increased coordination and integration of information from other agencies and information sources." The SWAMP Strategy was written and accepted by USEPA in 2005. Water Board staff is currently updating the SWAMP Strategy to dovetail better with the Monitoring Council's strategy and to incorporate the last five years of progress. Jonathan Bishop, Linda Sheehan, and Val Connor met on October 13 to discuss the relationship between these two documents. Linda was concerned that both documents clarify the connection and differences between the two strategies. b) Existing budgetary constraints need to be considered in how the Monitoring Council moves forward in the short and longer term. c) In developing its strategy update, SWAMP is in the process of narrowing and strengthening its focus on those beneficial use/water body types and other items where it has strengths, leaving other beneficial use/water body types to the Monitoring Council's strategy and other theme-based workgroups. SWAMP will focus on: Healthy Streams Initiative, including the perennial streams assessment ii) Development of biological objectives iii) Bioaccumulation Oversight Group's ongoing efforts to assess safe-to-eat fish and shellfish in lakes and reservoirs, rivers and streams, and coastal waters iv) CEDEN development to support the theme-based internet portals as well as Water Board staff and regulated community needs The relationship between these activities and those of the Monitoring Council will be the major focus of the June 2010 Council meeting. a) SB 1070 [see Subsections 13181(e)(1) and (7)] **Attachments:** b) February 2, 2009 Monitoring Council Meeting Notes [see Item #3, Decision 5]

Decisions:	a) The Monitoring Council agreed that the comprehensive monitoring program strategy called for in SB 1070 will be a Monitoring Council product. The SWAMP monitoring and assessment strategy will be updated by the State Water Board staff, but will be integrated into the Monitoring Council's strategy as an appendix. Also included will be an updated assessment framework.	
	b) The Monitoring Council's strategy will encompass all water body types and beneficial uses. The updated SWAMP strategy will have a more limited focus on wadeable streams, contaminant accumulation in fish/shellfish, biologic objectives, the assessment framework, and tools for QA and data management.	
	c) The Monitoring Council agreed that the level of effort implementing the strategy will depend on available funding. Until additional funding has been identified and secured, the Monitoring Council may need to meet less frequently, but will continue to pursue the creation of new workgroups and water quality portals as staff time permits. Change emphasis to developing new workgroups, rather than creating portals as proof of concept. Once new funding becomes available, the Monitoring Council will more aggressively pursue implementation of its comprehensive monitoring program strategy.	
	d) The Monitoring Council will have a long-term role to oversee implementation of the comprehensive strategy.	
	e) Equal participation and enthusiasm from organizations within both Cal/EPA and the Natural Resources Agency are needed for the strategy to be successful.	
	f) The Monitoring Council approved moving its June 9, 2010 meeting to Sacramento to coincide with the SWAMP Roundtable meeting (June 8 & 9), and to focus the meeting on the connections between SWAMP and the Monitoring Council, with the major emphasis on SWAMP reporting on:

Background:	a) On October 26, Jon Marshack demonstrated the Safe-to-Swim and draft Safe-to-Eat portals to the Water Boards' Water Quality Coordinating Committee (comprised of the Board Members, Executive Director, and Division Chiefs of the State Water Board and the Board Members and Executive Officers of the nine Regional Water Boards).	
	At the September 29, 2009 Monitoring Council meeting:	
	i) OEHHA representative Bob Brodberg presented concerns regarding the draft Safe-to-Eat Fish & Shellfish portal. The Monitoring Council directed that specific revisions be made to the portal, that the Bioaccumulation Oversight Group (BOG) take ownership of the revised portal, and that the revised portal be brought back for Monitoring Council review and approval prior to going public.	d
	ii) Terry Fleming was tasked with attending the next meeting of the Multi- Agency Rocky Intertidal Network (MARINe) to encourage them to become a work group of the Monitoring Council and to develop a question-based internet portal.	
	iii) The Monitoring Council decided that SWAMP and the Water Board's Healthy Streams Initiative should become a workgroup focused on stream ecosystem health and should develop a mock-up of an internet portal on that theme.	
	 iv) Jon Marshack was tasked with developing internet portal development guidelines for theme-based workgroups. 	
	v) The Council requested a plan for workgroups to post and deliver to agencies/organizations critiques of their monitoring and assessment programs. Reaction from the BOG is that this will take considerable time and there are no resources available to perform these critiques. It may be too early to address this until additional funding is made available.	е
	vi) Val Connor was tasked with talking to Chris Beegan about developing a workgroup for benthic invertebrates and sediment quality objectives (SQOs). A combination of the SQO science team and the stakeholder advisory committee may form the basis for such a workgroup.	
	c) At their November 24, 2009 meeting, a revised Safe-to-Eat portal was demonstrated and the BOG voted to endorse its public release, pending	

	Monitoring Council approval. BOG members were given until December 1 to review the portal in more detail and to identify any potential "show stoppers." The BOG also voted to take ownership of the portal and to continue to maintain, develop and refine it in the future. Their only caveat was that long-term stable funding will be needed for this effort.

Background:	A number of data management issue have arisen during the development of the initial internet portals, including:	
	a) Many relevant data are not readily accessible in electronic form	
	b) Shadow databases have been developed to feed data to the internet portals	
	c) An exchange network (e.g., CEDEN) does not yet exist to allow the sharing of data across agencies and organizations and to provide data to the portals	
	d) The use of multiple GIS platforms hinders the sharing of map-based tools across portals	
	e) The State of California will be developing data management and GIS standards	
	f) All parties need to commit to maintain and regularly update portal items that they have developed (e.g., Data & Trends map in Safe-to-Eat) as new information becomes available	
	g) The use of multiple databases requires maintenance of common global IDs or common crosswalk tables	
	In its December 2008 Recommendations report, the Monitoring Council stressed that a balance is needed between standardization and the flexibility needed by theme-based workgroups to accomplish their goals and to strive for innovative solutions.	
	At the September 29 Monitoring Council meeting Brock Bernstein was tasked with further developing the data management group paper, including list of questions to be addressed, and inviting potential Data Management Group members and a representative of the California Office of the Chief Information Officer to attend the next Monitoring Council meeting for a structured discussion of organizing principles, mission, and tasks. <i>Invited individuals are requested to</i>	

bring their individual expertise to the discussion, and not necessarily as representatives of their respective agencies. The focus of the Data Management Workgroup should be twofold: Looking inward to support portal development and maintenance and underlying data management tools and platforms Looking outward for new data management tools and concepts that would benefit the portals and underlying data structure Once the Monitoring Council decides on the membership and tasks for the Data Management Workgroup, Brock and Jon Marshack will recruit the members, and schedule initial meeting(s). A CEDEN planning meeting was held at SCCWRP on November 24, 2009.
