




Core Functions of the SRWP







Monitoring in the Sacramento River Watershed

The Sacramento River Watershed Program (SRWP has been monitoring the Sacramento River and its major tributaries since 1998. The SRWP's monitoring program was started because there was a need to better understand water quality in the Sacramento River

Thus far, over \$5 million has been spent on the SRWF Monitoring Program through grant funding from the USEPA and more recently a Proposition 50 Watershed Program grant. In Implementing its monitoring program, the SRWP has collaborated with monitoring efforts of other agencies including the Central Valley Regional Water Quality Control Board, U.S. Geological Survey, California Department of Water Resources and Department of Fish and Game.

The goals of the monitoring program were to develop a cost-efficient, coordinated monitoring program that assessed baseline conditions in the Sacramento River's main stem and its tributaries; one that identified causes, effects and extent of problems; and one which could be used to measure improvements in management.
