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STEERING COMMITTEE FOR THE DATA MANAGEMENT WORKGROUP

On behalf of the California Water Quality Monitoring Council (Monitoring Council), we wish to invite you to serve on the Steering Committee of the Data Management Workgroup (DMWG) of the Monitoring Council. Since 2011, the DMWG has been serving as the steward of technical knowledge related to water quality data management, data utilization, and associated technology development. The workgroup has now reached a point in its evolution when it requires a steering committee to advise its actions and maximize its impact.

This moment is prompted by the publication of the Environmental Data Summit white paper in September 2015: http://deltacouncil.ca.gov/enhancing-the-visionfor-managing-californias-environmental-information. The white paper issued several key recommendations that have since been embraced by environmental data users, data providers, and the Monitoring Council itself, which sees in the recommendations many reflections of its enabling legislation, SB 1070 (Statutes of 2006). Fostering greater data-sharing among agencies and the public is inherent to the white paper and the Monitoring Council alike.

Why a Steering Committee?

We need your service on the Steering Committee to help guide ongoing initiatives in constructive ways to favor smart choices over incapacitating and wasteful obstructions. Our aim is to have your organization represented by one or two members to ensure that your short- and long-term objectives remain in focus. Your expertise, authority, and experience could help to influence this effort and play an important role in the forthcoming development of an interagency Science Action Agenda that the Delta Science Program is spearheading in close collaboration with its Delta Science Plan implementation partners, key among which is the Monitoring Council.

With several data-sharing initiatives already underway across California's natural resource and environmental protection agencies, each effort is optimized to meet a given agency or programmatic mandate. However, with a modest level of coordination, these individual efforts can be mutually integrated to yield much greater value for all.

Work of the Steering Committee

We anticipate that the Steering Committee, among its tasks, will provide oversight to tackle the following:

- Review the recommendations enumerated in the white paper;
- Identify challenges to implementation of the recommendations;
- Propose recommended strategies for overcoming these challenges, so they can be included in the forthcoming Science Action Agenda;
- Evaluate the practicality and efficacy of specific forms of interagency coordination/collaboration;
- Foster communication among the various data initiatives and the higher authorities leading them; and
- Review and approve the strategic goals and annual work plans of the DMWG.

In all the latest data-sharing efforts, a truism is emerging: value for today's information is measured not only in how well it meets a narrow set of individual needs but also in how well it integrates with other systems. The value of our data is improved by its reuse. You can have a prominent role in measuring and amplifying that value for your own agency's benefit.

Anticipated Time Commitment

We anticipate quarterly meetings, at most, out of respect for your busy schedule and competing commitments.

A Rare Opportunity

In several places, the white paper references a "broad-based workgroup" to guide implementation of its recommendations. Meanwhile, proposed legislation such as AB 1755, "The Open and Transparent Water Data Act," also call for greater information exchange. There are smart ways to achieve such goals, but presumably, without adequate thought and planning, there could instead be inefficient and onerous solutions.

This is the time to set a smart course for more robust data sharing. And we feel that you are a critical part of the right team to make it happen.
