

# Planning the Monitoring Council's Future

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#### Outcomes from the Triennial Audit

- Dedicated resources and greater authority are needed to allow the Council to fulfill its mission.
  - SB 1070 came with no dedicated funding and no authority to compel state governmental organizations to participate.
  - Progress made to date is largely through in-kind services, voluntary efforts, and occasional grants.

#### Outcomes from the Triennial Audit

- Subcommittee formed August 27, 2015
  - ▶ Feedback: be more opportunistic in the efforts it supports
- Briefing with the Undersecretary for CalEPA
  - ▶ Feedback: support priority initiatives of the administration

# Feedback from the May 23rd meeting

- Strong support for the Council and its mission.
- The Council's strength—its convening power
- The Council should support emerging issues and to remain opportunistic.
- The Council has value in bringing agency stakeholders together for coordination and collaboration.
- The Council may not add value for organizations that already make their data available to the public.

# Subcommittee Recommendations

## 1. Review and update the Council's Strategy

- Hire a facilitator to help guide this effort and to develop the updated Strategy document.
- Identify who the Council serves (e.g., the public, agency decision makers, or both).
- Continue to support emerging issues (e.g., HABs)
- Solicit input from the Secretaries for Natural Resources and CalEPA.

# Subcommittee Recommendations

## 2. Strategize how to modify Council membership

- Identify ways to better engage key organizations within the Natural Resources Agency and CalEPA.
- Continue outreach with key representatives from May 23 meeting (e.g., IEP, DWR, and DPR).
- Identify members with stronger connections to the Agency Secretaries.
